



- Multidisciplinary team approach
- Good communication between Intensivists, Radiologists and Surgeons
- Requires planning
- Part of changing therapeutic options
- Need to avoid open surgery
- Large drains placed under CT guidance
- Active management of drains

- Clarity about placement to allow further endoscopic and laproscopic options using drain track the Clinician and the Radiologist
- The Radiologist should therefore be very visible to the patient in this situation







The Incidental liver lesion - How should we solve the diagnostic conundrum in 2012?

- The definition of "incidental" might be different according to the Radiologist or to the Clinician.
- Ultrasonography is the most common entry, and also the ideal place to establish the dialogue with the patient.
- MRI is usually the most complementary examination, but is not always needed.
- MRI, if performed, requires different specific protocols according to the detailed clinical background.

- Establishing a strategy, concerning either added examinations or follow-up, is a shared responsibility. between the Clinician and the Radiologist
- The Radiologist should therefore be very visible to the patient in this situation.

Follow up and assessment of treatment response

- Due to the increasing number of patients and treatments, to improved survival, and to the necessity to assess the efficacy of costly treatments, assessment of response is probably today one of the most common indications for imaging.
- Because the treatment decision relies mainly on imaging, the Radiologist should be aware of his own importance in the strategy.

- Knowledge of the international standards is essential in order to share words and their significance.
- CT is the work horse of tumour response assessment, although MRI may take an increasing role in the future.

Update on imaging in acute pancreatitis and complications

- Acute pancreatitis (AP) is defined as an acute inflammatory process of the pancreas with variable involvement of other regional tissues or remote organ systems (Atlanta International Symposium 1992).
- This disease can range from a mild self-limiting condition to (in approx. 15-20%) clinically severe AP with local and systemic complications requiring prolonged hospitalisation, significant morbidity and high rates of mortality.
- This short lecture will cover the following educational objectives:
 - 1 To briefly review of the causes of acute pancreatitis and current theories of pathophysiology.
 - 2 To critically review the various severity classification systems both clinical and biochemical (including Atlanta, SOFA, Ranson, APACHE II) and radiologically directed (including Balthazar, CT severity index, Modified CT severity index, revised Atlanta).

- 3 To understand the rationale behind the numerous scoring systems and the central role of imaging in modern multidisciplinary care of AP patients, illustrating the links between academic theory and real world radiological reporting. To clarify widely used confusing and inappropriate nomenclature.
- 4 To describe the many local and systemic complications of AP and the indication, timing and modality of imaging required to evaluate. To discuss the types of pancreatic necrosis, radiological evaluation of peri-pancreatic fluid collections and pseudocysts, the evaluation and importance of differentiation of sterile and infected post-necrotic fluid collections, and the imaging of vascular complications.

The Role of Interventional Radiology in the Management of Colorectal Liver Metastases

- To facilitate Liver Resection by increasing the volume of the potential liver remnant with portal vein embolisation +/- hepatic vein embolisation.
- Treatment of colorectal liver metastases with loco-regional treatment: Local ablation, transarterial chemoembolisation, radio-embolisation.




